Jan 27th AGM & Social Evening


The AGM will be followed by a fuddle and a chance to see old photographs of Lambley, which we have been busy cataloguing.

July 26th Guided Tour of Derby Roundhouse

Commencing life in 1839, The Roundhouse Grade II listed building has been restored to its former glory and is now the legend centerpiece of Derby College. The Roundhouse has been recognized by the Guinness World Records as the oldest locomotive roundhouse in the world. Walk in the footsteps of engineer George Stephenson (North Midland Railway), constructor of the Roundhouse and discover how the town of Derby prospered at the forefront of Britain's industrial revolution. Nov 24th David Bate - The Lost Church of St Ethelburga

The former existence of a church dedicated to St Ethelburga in the Vale of Belvoir has long been known, although differing claims have been made for its precise location. There has not even been agreement as to which parish it served, but a document in the Vatican archives tells us that in 1405 it was a place of pilarimage in the fields near Langar 'to which a great multitude resorts'. Since 2002, David Bate has been attempting to lift the veil of mystery that has long hung over this fascinating site, utilising both documentary sources and noninvasive fieldwork. There may even be a link to the lost shrine of St Eadburh at Southwell!



Oct 27th Michael Harrison - Visiting The Western Front

An illustrated talk depicting what the visitor can expect to see

Those of us who now find ourselves in our mid sixties probably had a grandfather or great uncle who served on the Western Front during the period of the First World War. Many of us have grandchildren or nieces and nephews who are three generations removed from that time of conflict. My own paternal grandfather [Pop] would never speak of his war service with the Durham Light Infantry; it was up to me to tread my own path in later years to discover where and when he took part in the momentous events that rocked the very core of Great Britain and Europe. The First World War proved to be very well documented and mapped, allowing me to literally follow in Pop's footsteps. Our family have been privileged to walk the same fields and tracks as our ancestor as he experienced the battles of the Somme, Arras and Ypres.

Visiting the old battlefields brings history to life. It is paradoxical that the 'Silent Cities' of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's war cemeteries bring the reality of those now distant days to light. Going a stage further, the visitor can delve deeper into the events that took place, being armed with trench maps and battalion war diaries allows the explorer to pull back the curtain on the 'window of time' and peer however briefly, into the world of the Western Front. Join us for an experience defined by the words Geoffrey Winthrop Young: 'There will be voices whispering down these ways, the while one wanderer is left to hear'.
